A Word of Thanks

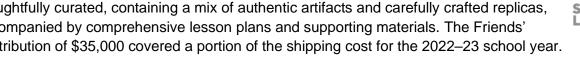
The Canadian War Museum (the Museum) appreciates the Friends of the Canadian War Museum's (the Friends) commitment to support a wide range of the Museum's core priorities. In fiscal year (FY) 2022–23, your contribution supported:

- two key educational initiatives—Supply Line and Youth Remembrance programming
- a new Research Fellowship Program
- parking for Veterans at the Museum.

We are pleased to report on your contribution's impact.

1) Supply Line educational program

This national educational outreach initiative provides schools with hands-on curriculumlinked discovery boxes for in-class exploration. Two sets of Supply Line discovery boxes are in circulation—First World War and Second World War. These discovery boxes are thoughtfully curated, containing a mix of authentic artifacts and carefully crafted replicas, accompanied by comprehensive lesson plans and supporting materials. The Friends' contribution of \$35,000 covered a portion of the shipping cost for the 2022–23 school year.



Target audience: National—For students from grades 4 to 12

Impact of contribution: During the 2022-23 school year, 30 First World War and 20 Second World War boxes were fully booked and loaned—free of charge—to 471 schools across Canada. This is 10% higher than the previous year and in line with pre-pandemic numbers. Supply Line reached 10 provinces and the Yukon.

By bringing history to life in the classroom, this program fosters a deeper understanding and appreciation of the past while enhancing students' critical thinking and analytical skills. As a result, students are better equipped to understand the historical context, draw connections to the present and develop a broader perspective on global events.

2) Youth programming for Remembrance

We are pleased to report the resounding success of our Youth Night event at the Museum, which took place on Thursday, November 10, 2022. The night was dedicated to honouring Remembrance and commemorating the significance of this important occasion.

The event included a number of activities, from a formal presentation on the importance of Remembrance to a series of interactive hands-on activities held throughout the Museum. These activities allowed the young attendees to connect more deeply with historical artifacts and exhibits, fostering an understanding of the significance of Remembrance.

The Friends' contribution of \$10,000—as well as the volunteer support provided—ensured a successful, inspiring evening for all attendees.

Target audience: Local—For members of the Girl Guides of Canada and Scouts Canada

Impact of contribution: The event was a great success—543 members from the guiding and scouting communities took part. These types of collective efforts strengthen our mission to educate and inspire future generations about the significance of Remembrance.

3) Research Fellowship

The Museum planned to launch a new Research Fellowship Program in fall 2022. We encountered delays but are pleased to report that a research fellowship posting has been successfully released to various academic and research institutions, inviting qualified candidates to apply. We have received encouraging responses, and the application period is now closed. We look forward to announcing a candidate soon and anticipate that the Fellow will begin their tenure in the coming fall, aligning with the academic calendar to ensure a seamless transition into their research role.

We thank you for your generous contribution of \$50,000 toward this important initiative.

4) Parking for Veterans

Our visitors appreciate the Friends' long-time support of free parking for Veterans visiting the Museum.

Target Audience: Veterans

Impact of your contribution: We estimate that your contribution of \$5,000 allowed 385 Veterans to park at no cost while visiting the Museum.
